# ELKS PROSPERITY CAR WILL ARRIVE HERE TUES. A. M.

## One Of White And Purple Fleet; Stop At Elks Club.

One of the cars of the official Elk-Viking Prosperity Fleet is scheduled to arrive here tomorrow morning about 10 o'clock, thus completing another leg of its transcontinental journey from the far west to the Elks' Grand Lodge convention at Atlantic City, N. J. There are eight cars of the white and purple fleet covering different territory and going into the convention city over different routes and they are all due to arrive in Atlantic City Sunday, July 6, the day previous to the opening of the convention.

Robert Clift is head of the party with the prosperity car that will arrive here tomorrow morning, coming from Charlotte, where the night will be spent. On arrival here the party will be piloted to the Elks club where members of Salisbury lodge No. 699 will meet and greet the visitors. All elks who possibly can be asked to meet in the club rooms in the Yancey building tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock to meet the visitors.

From rear light to radiator, the car is painted with the official purple and white of the Order of Elks, and is piloted by a member of the order who is drawn from the advertising staff of The Elks Magazine, sponsors of the prosperity tour.

On their transcontinental journey, the cars of this fleet are scheduled to visit some 415 Elks clubs, and they will travel more than 18,000 miles to do this. Preliminary to the actual start, the cars were christened in Lansing, Mich., by Governor Fred Green of that state. At Seattle, Denver and Omaha, the points of starting, the cars were gotten under way with an elaborate series of ceremonies conducted by the members of Elks lodges in those cities who were aided by the cooperation of many important state and city officials.
